From the President

In April, I had the opportunity to attend the National CF Annual General meeting. This meeting brings together representatives from all the chapters to share ideas and help set the direction for the foundation for the upcoming year. There are many different sessions, but I want to focus on one event in particular - the Kin Luncheon. I had the fortune of attending the NAGM in Edmonton last year, so this was going to be my second Kin luncheon - and being "experienced" at this event, I had my Kleenex in tow as I headed to lunch.

This lunch is an opportunity to celebrate our relationship with the Kinsmen and Kinettes around the country and thank them for what they have done for the fight against cystic fibrosis. For those of you that don't know, our relationship with the Kin started on a barstool in 1963, and since then, the Kin have raised over \$32 million in support of CF. At this particular lunch, we heard from a 13 year old girl that received her double lung transplant when she was 11. Her story was incredibly inspiring, she showed more courage and life experience than most of us have as adults. After she spoke, Dave Perkins, Kin Canada President said a few words. He thanked us. He thanked us for giving the Kin a cause to work for and believe in. He thanked us for letting them make a difference to people that suffered from CF. Think about that for a moment...shouldn't we be thanking them? The incredible generosity of the Kin and Kinettes has made a huge difference to the research and treatment of cystic fibrosis - and they are thanking us for that? As I listened to him speak, I realized what an incredible organization Kin Canada is, and how amazing the people are that make up the individual clubs. We have been blessed in Edmonton with extremely supportive Kin clubs, and seeing their commitment to cystic fibrosis has always amazed me. The vast majority of these people do not have a direct connection to CF - just a desire to make a difference. Seeing their president speak at a national level, thanking us, showed me that we are not just blessed in Edmonton, but across the country with amazing support and strength. At the end of the Kin luncheon, there wasn't a dry eye in the room - emotion brought on by the strength and courage of a 13 year old, and the commitment and dedication of Kin Canada.

So, on that note, I want to personally thank the Kin clubs in Edmonton and across Canada for their incredible support in the fight. You have never wavered in your support for us and you have made a difference - a bigger difference than can ever be quantified in a "thank-you". I also encourage anyone that knows a Kinsman or Kinette to take a minute and personally thank them - their support is priceless.

Clinic News - CF Related Diabetes (CFRD)

What is CF RELATED DIABETES (CFRD)?

CF Related diabetes is thought to be caused by damage to the pancreas. Thick mucus clogs the tubes in your pancreas making it hard for it to function. The pancreas is an organ that has 2 main jobs. The first is to make and secrete insulin, and the second is to make and secrete enzymes and other digestive juices. As people with CF are living longer, the number of persons who have diabetes is increasing. The type of diabetes that develops as a result of CF is different from other types of diabetes.

Common Symptoms:

- very thirsty
- weight loss
- urinate often
- very hungry
- lack of energy
- unexplained decrease in lung function

If symptoms of CFRD are left untreated, it can lead to problems with your CF including:

- thick mucous that is difficult to clear
- trouble keeping a healthy weight
- muscle loss

- less able to fight infection
- high blood sugar over time may damage blood vessels in your eyes and kidneys which could lead to blindness or kidney failure

Testing For CFRD

A random blood glucose (sugar) level is done with routine blood work yearly. Fasting blood glucose levels are followed if random levels are elevated. Hemoglobin A1C is done to follow long term glucose levels.

Treatment

The treatment varies but many people with CF need injections of insulin one or more times a day. They also need to check their blood sugar at different times during the day. The CF related diabetic diet is much different from the diabetic diets other people are given. There is still a need to eat high calorie, high fat foods and not to cut back on the amount of calories taken a day. "Simple sugars" such as soft drinks and candies should be avoided. The CF clinic usually consults the diabetes specialists for their expertise

HBC Points

Are you collecting points with an Hbc card (Zellers, Bay, Home Outfitters)? You could donate those points to Cystic Fibrosis. The Canadian Cystic Fibrosis Foundation receives a quarterly update of all donation totals and redeems the points for an annual cash contribution from Hbc. Here is what you need to do to donate this way:



1. Make sure you have the Hbc Rewards card. You can apply for one either in person at one of the stores or by going on-line to www.hbc.com/hbc rewards, clicking on the Enroll tab, and continuing to follow the instructions.
2. Once you have the card, you can choose to donate a portion or all of your points to a number of charities including CF. To donate your points, again either visit your nearest Zellers, Bay, or Home Outfitters and complete a donation designation form, or you can go on-line (same address as above), click on the Community Program tab, and search for the CCFF account. You will need to have your card so you can enter its number when you are donating.
